





EARLY YEARS SERVICES

- ▶ providing low-barrier access to programs that support the diverse needs of families with children ages 0-6
- > prenatal health, postpartum support, infant/child development, food security, parenting strategies and other resources available

Community Action Programming for Children (CAPC)

- ► Creative Playtime groups (Kelowna & Peachland), Food Security Support, Parent Talk, and Special Deliveries programming
- ▶ **2426** parents supported
- ▶ **4563** children supported

Beyond the Blues (Postpartum Depression/Anxiety Support)

- ▶ **42** sessions held
- ▶ **39** individuals supported
- ▶ 110 referrals received

Prenatal Wellness

- drop-in program for pregnant people and their partners; offered in partnership with Kelowna Family Y
- ▶ **49** sessions held
- ▶ 108 individuals supported

OPENING OUR SECOND BRIDGEWAY TREATMENT CENTRE

With the support of Interior Health, we were able to open an additional Bridgeway location on Ethel Street in October 2022. This facility has 9 participant beds, and serves female-identifying participants. "Ethel House" functions on a continuous intake model, meaning participants can enter as soon as beds become available. The staff at this site served 31 individuals this year. Of those who entered, nearly 60% completed the program. From there, just over 38% moved on to our Supported Recovery program.

RECOVERY & ADDICTIONS SERVICES

Bridgeway (Intensive Live-In Treatment)

- generous grant through Horsemanship for Life provided participant access to Horseworks, an Equine Assisted Learning program; encourages personal and professional skill development
- invested in participant/staff comfort through renovations to common areas and improvements to our HVAC systems
- ▶ 171 individuals supported

Youth Recovery House

- enhanced recreation programming including a partnership with the Kelowna Badminton Club for youth to participate in healthy physical activity
- ▶ added self-serve area in the dining room for youth to prepare their own breakfast and snacks to foster independence and healthy decision-making
- ▶ 62 individuals supported

Withdrawal Management Services (WMS)

Royal & Hwy 33

- 8 new WMS beds and 4 transition beds added in January2023 with opening of new facility on Royal Avenue
- ➤ renovations to space and improvements to our HVAC systems to improve comfort and wellbeing of participants/staff
- ▶ **595** individuals supported

Supported Recovery (Kelowna/Penticton)

- ▶ launched additional transition program (4 beds) located at Royal Ave; focusing on personal independence/family reunification
- strengthened external partnerships to support positive community reintegration (i.e. WorkBC for vocational support)
- ▶ **53** individuals supported

Outreach/Overdose Prevention Services

- improvements made to function and accessibility of our Harm Reduction Vending Machine in Rutland
- initiated Harm Reduction Home Delivery serving Westbank to Oyama
- ▶ staff vehicle purchased; made possible by support from the Central Okanagan Community Action Team and a generous donor
- ► **6354** client contacts

YOUTH & FAMILY SERVICES

Etcetera (2SLGBTQIA+ Youth Group)

- supported the Adolescent Psychiatric Unit at KGH in providing youth with gender-affirming items
- received over \$10,000 in donations from Pride Month campaigns run by local businesses/organizations
- ► hosted Pride Prom with over 80 youth attendees
- ▶ **45** sessions held

Child, Youth & Family Support

- ► connected at-risk youth to supports that helped them remain in school and maintain stable housing; part of the Upstream project in partnership with BGC Okanagan
- ▶ provided supportive, educational and goal-oriented counselling to families identified by the MCFD
- ► facilitated three public Parenting Your Anxious Youth support groups (five sessions each) for caregivers
- ▶ 170 individuals supported

The Path

- care/respite for young people with complex needs in MCFD approved foster homes
- provided caregivers and youth access to expert care to promote stability and success in all facets of life
- ▶ 20 individuals supported

Foster Home Support

- ▶ assisted caregivers in developing a deeper understanding of the children they care for, including crisis intervention and debriefing
- ▶ 10 youth in 9 homes supported
